Children's Centres

- 42 Children's Centres across metropolitan and regional South Australia
- 5 more Children's Centres are planned to open within the next 2 years







4 Children and Family Centres

- Established through the National Partnership for Indigenous Early Childhood Development
- Focusing on supporting Aboriginal families to have the best possible start in life





Vision

in a universal setting with targeted responses for families who may require additional support.


Multidisciplinary Teams

Community Development Coordinators

- Work in partnership with other agencies to facilitate a range of programs and services.
- Collect, input and analyse AEDC and local data
- Coordinate the delivery of services
- Connect with local agencies



Family Services Coordinators

- Support vulnerable families
- Help strengthen family and community capacity in responding to children
- Provide parenting programs focusing on relationships and well being.





Allied Health

Speech Pathologists Occupational Therapists

- Assist children to develop play and social skills, language and movement.
- Support centre staff to identify children at risk of developmental delay
- Promote children's development




Communities for Children





Governance Structure



Partnership Group

- Coordinates agency activities
- Develops a centre vision
- Monitors family and community consultation
- Has a rep on the Governing Council
- Brings together agencies/partners with shared responsibility for young children and families from across the community



Leadership Team

- Contributes to the development of a CC vision
- Provides advice to the Partnership and Governing Council on services and programs
- Develops strategies for encouraging broad community participation and engagement based on advice from the Parent Engagement Group
- Monitors service outcomes and provides advice to continuously improve services

Parent Engagement Group

Assist and influence decision making across the centre:

 Supporting families to be actively engaged in services, programs and identification of community needs

Providing advice to the Leadership Team and

Partnership Group on programs and services needed in or through the Centres
